<b>Compulsory</b> REVISION comments	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. In the view of the possible readers from different parts of the world, the author should add "generic name" of the drugs used.</li> <li>2. Key words – could it be more reachable if it includes tricuspid atresia?</li> <li>3. The author needs to decide whether he/she will present as first person or second person narrative. This can avoid the sentence such as "While pregnant, I drank too much alcohol" compared to "A mother who contracted a viral infection (especially German measles) while pregnant."</li> <li>4. Diagnostic assessment: normal value should be added to the patient's values.</li> <li>5. Same comment from no 1, applies for therapeutic intervention in page 3.</li> <li>6. The two paragraphs from discussion and conclusion are 95% similar.</li> <li>7. It is not clear which major treatment the child has received such as surgery and the specific improvement should be mentioned rather than dramatic improvement. For instance, such and such symptoms relieved, some symptoms maintained, or some cured etc. "Until my final day of care" raised my curiosity first whether the patient is still doing well. But according to the manuscript, I believe the baby is fine.</li> </ol>	
<b>Minor</b> REVISION comments	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Please relook the manuscript in general to improve grammar and sentence construction.               <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. some "full stops" are missing, and the author adds "comma" between two sentences. E.g., in the first para of the abstract.</li> <li>b. Some words are repeating. E.g., cyanosis in the second para of the abstract</li> </ol> </li> <li>2. Could the "AVBRH" be written in full form at the first time and then the author can use the abbreviated form in the future.</li> <li>3. Page 2, past medical history – needs to be revised for grammar. "he not has" is not appropriate.</li> <li>4. Similar to the past intervention and outcomes "patient not take" and "As breathing difficulty, they when went to private clinics from where he was referred to AVBRH for further treatment." Needs improvement.</li> <li>5. Clinical findings" Cyanosis, feeding problems, cyanosis, shortness of breath and quick breathing, sluggish development, and a heart murmur are all symptoms of cyanosis" I think second cyanosis is by mistake.</li> </ol>	
<b>Optional/General</b> comments	<p>Overall acceptable in terms of clinical relevance but it would be great if the author relook into grammar, sentence construction.            I would suggest the author to use "my patient" instead of "my child" which can create some confusions.            Key words can include "tricuspid atresia"            References session should be improved.</p>
